What Can a Duck Do?

All animals at our shelter are in need of a second chance. They have been lost, given up or abandoned, usually through no fault of their own. You are giving them that chance for a new life in a loving home by participating in the Rubber Duck Pluck, our annual fundraiser. By purchasing a few \$5 rubber ducks (raffles), you directly save lives.

Every animal that comes to Pet Allies has a wellness check. Each one is vaccinated, spayed or neutered and microchipped in addition to being given plenty of food and a warm bed as they await their forever home. A life renewed.

When an animal's new family adopts him or her, the cycle of unwanted litters and pet over-population stops because that animal has been spayed or neutered. These surgeries are the 100% certain line of defense in eliminating the potential suffering of unwanted animals. Lives saved.

The staff at Pet Allies devote their time and energy daily to the care of cats, dogs, and the occasional rabbit or bird. They care for the ones who were cast aside. These animals are fed, bathed, given medical attention, and their kennels cleaned. It's a labor of love and it costs money. But these lives are now filled with hope not despair or illness.

That's what a duck can do.

- Provide low cost spay or neuter surgeries to prevent unwanted litters and reduce pet over-population.
- Provide medical care to sick or injured animals.
- Feed, shelter and care for homeless animals until they find their forever home.

You are probably aware that Pet Allies has been struggling to find a veterinarian after celebrating the retirement of Dr. Andersen.

Although we had what seemed like plenty of time before his retirement, over a year, hiring has been a challenge and a learning experience.

At the same time, many people started working from home, or stayed home during the pandemic, and became aware of their own health, and also had the time to start noticing health problems with their pets sooner. The pandemic has changed the

way people think about their pet's medical needs.

Veterinary clinics locally and across the nation are seeking to add doctors and techs to meet the needs of their communities which have increased dramatically. We have been able to add more appointments for health issues at the clinic. You can call 928-421-0787 to reach the clinic directly in our new location 1321 N 16th Street in Show Low.

New graduates can pick and choose from among thousands of positions, estimated to be 13,000 openings currently in the U.S. We love our town but

it may not be a huge draw for everyone. We are happy to have a part-time doctor, and we are seeking to additionally hire a spay/neuter surgeon to meet the needs of our local community.



It's sunset and all is quiet in the yard. Fido is walking the fence line making sure that all is well with his world when this angry black and white cat has the audacity to turn and spray him. "The nerve!" After the creature ambles away, your friend shaking his head and rubbing his eyes wants 'in' so he can tell you about it. We all know it wasn't a black and white cat, but a skunk. Here is a recipe that one of our local vets suggested.

Items needed for your summer first aid kit:

- 1. Saline eye wash from local pet store
- 2. Baking Soda
- 3. 3% Hydrogen Peroxide
- 4. Dawn dish soap
- 5. White vinegar
- 6. Rubber dishwashing gloves
- 7. Old towels
- 8. Dog shampoo or baby shampoo

For the face:

If eyes are irritated, rinse first with cold water, then with saline. Use a product expressly made for pets. Next, after flushing the eyes, make a paste of Baking Soda and water which is 1 part soda / 3 parts water. Using a rag, distribute the paste and let it sit for 5 or more minutes. Be prepared with treats to keep your dog still. Be sure to watch for vomiting or breathing difficulties as if the dog took a direct hit, he may have inhaled the spray. If any of that occurs call your vet.

For the body:

Wearing rubber gloves, wipe the oil away with a clean rag, then dispose of the rag. Next, mix the ingredients below. The mixture will foam, so work quickly and carefully avoiding the face. Try and remain calm, as your dog will pick up on your emotions. He needs to cooperate, so you both come through this smelling like...well it won't be a rose, but hopefully it will be better than skunk.

- 1. ¼ cup of baking soda.
- 2. 1-2 teaspoons of mild dishwashing detergent like Dawn.
- 3. 1 quart of 3% Hydrogen Peroxide solution.
- 4. Mix in a bucket and use immediately.
- 5. Work the foaming mixture well into the coat.
- 6. Rinse with warm water.
- 8. ½ cup of white vinegar if smell is still strong, then rinse again well.
