Happy Holidays!

Keeping pets safe this holiday season

Tis the season to be merry! Having your home decorated for the holidays is definitely cheerful, but may pose a few risks to your pets. Here are some helpful holiday hints to keep your home and your animals safe during this Christmas season.

- Candles & Liquid Potpourri: remember that holiday-scented candles and potpourri smell good to you AND your furry friends. Candles and liquid potpourri may be knocked over or licked, causing burns on the skin and/or mouth.
- Snow Globes: some imported snow globes may contain antifreeze, which contains a sweet-tasting toxic chemical called ethylene glycol. This chemical is extremely dangerous to animals and your veterinarian should be called immediately if you think that antifreeze has been ingested.
- Holiday Plants: Lillies, holly, mistletoe berries, poinsettia, and amaryllis are toxic to pets. Lillies are particularly dangerous to cats and may cause kidney failure with the ingestion of just a few leaves or petals.
- Tinsel: cats may be drawn to tinsel, which when eaten may cause a painful obstruction within the digestive tract.
- Tree Tipping: pets may try to climb or knock over trees to get to the ornaments or just for fun. Please safely anchor your tree to prevent falling hazards.
- Edible Tree Ornaments: edible ornaments entice pets to climb the tree, turning your tree into a falling hazard.
- Glass Ornaments: glass ornaments are attractive for pets to play with and chew. These ornaments are generally made of thin glass

that breaks easily which can cause cuts to your animal's skin, feet, and/or mouth.

- Christmas Tree Lights: Christmas tree lights may be pulled off and chewed on by your pet, causing risk of electrocution and/or electrical burns. It is recommended that only the upper limbs of the tree be lit to discourage pets from chewing on lights that are easily reachable.
- Christmas gifts: content and packaging of Christmas gifts need to be considered. Most Christmas gifts are not digestible and may cause obstruction if ingested.

Animals as Gifts

We recommend the giving of pets as gifts only to people who have expressed a sustained interest in owning one, and the ability to care for it responsibly. We also recommend that pets be obtained from animal shelters, rescue organizations, friends, family or responsible breeders—not from places where the source of the animal is unknown or untrusted.

If the recipient is under 12 years old, the child's parents should be ready and eager to assume care for the animal. If the gift is a surprise, the gift-giver should be aware of the recipient's lifestyle and schedule—enough to know that the recipient has the time and means be a responsible owner.

The recipient's schedule should also be free enough to spend necessary time to help assure an easy transition into the home. This is especially important during the holidays and other busy times.

Nate truly was the "last cat standing" and it was thrilling to see such a happy ending to an unfortunate beginning to "Nate's" life.
