Hoarding Update

Over 120 Cats Taken In



As of September 27, 2021, 123 cats (and 4 dogs) were removed by animal control officers from one trailer in the Timberline trailer park in Show Low. These cats arrived at Pet Allies primarily over 2 days and immediate medical and emergency care was given.

Each animal brought to Pet Allies, was checked in and given a numbered collar, placed in a safe and clean crate with plenty of water and food and their health assessed by our vet techs. Cats in the most serious condition were helped first and all have been given vaccinations, flea and ear mite treatment, and were spayed or neutered. Most required dental care including extractions due to poor nutrition in an unsanitary and



desperately crowded environment.

Sadly, several cats were too ill to survive and were humanely euthanized.

Currently, 28 have been adopted, 16 are in foster care, 3 on a slumber party and 64 remain at the Pet Allies Animal Shelter or at the former Barkin' Basement location awaiting adoption.

This has been a heavy burden on our staff, volunteers and on our cash flow with having to care for so many additional lives beyond the dogs and cats already at our shelter. Pet Allies estimates the cost for care of these cats will exceed \$60,000. But, the support we have gotten and continue to receive, during this difficult situation is appreciated and has warmed our weary hearts!

Many folks have donated cat food and litter, crates and toys as well as cash for which we are forever grateful. Check out our newest fundraiser, CatLANDia which is a raffle for 40 acres of land east of Holbrook. More information on page 2 as well as on our web site at www.PetalliesAZ.org/raffle.

Well, Amanda, we're sure glad you found Pet Allies. You are a true asset to the team and to our furry friends!



what happens if you can't come home?

As a member of the board of Pet Allies, and secretary of the Arizona White Mountain Kennel Club, I, and my fellow board members have sadly had first-hand experience with having to care for pets when the unimaginable happens. With nothing in place from the owner, those of us left caring for the animals, scramble to reach out to traumatized family members hoping they are sympathetic to their loved one's animals' welfare. Gaining authorization and money for care can be a nightmare, adding to an already stressful time. An extended hospital stay can change your life as well as your ability to financially care for your animals. Your death will be life altering for them. Without proper planning, your babies could end up at a local animal shelter or worse.

Plan for their future care.

Set up a trust in your pet's name so that the funds in the trust will be used expressly for their future care. You will need a trustee or trustee's named in the account, someone who will act on behalf of your animals. A Trustee would also need to be willing to act at a moment's notice on your behalf, having access to your home and instructions for your animals' care.

You will also need a Pet Care Emergency Authorization Form on the Resources page on the Pet Allies website.

This form will need to be in a place where your trustee or trustee's can easily find it. Having one on file with your vet is also an option. This form allows care givers to take the animal to your vet if necessary and make life or death decisions in your absence. Your trust fund will allow them to continue care and feeding, and possibly transport to their new home if the need arises.

A few precautions on your part will ensure that the ones you love will live out their lives with love!
